WHY PLANT IN SOUTH JERSEY

It is Sunday in Nigeria, so why so few in their homes? The reason — 89% percent of Nigerian adults regularly attend church. It is also Sunday morning in Russia, so why so many in their homes? Only 2% of Russians attend church on regular bases.

In the United States the number attending church on a regular bases is 44%, and in NEW JERSEY 34%, right behind The Netherlands.

TRANSLATION: Two-thirds of the residents in South Jersey do not regularly hear the gospel preached.

Jesus looked over the grain fields of Samaria and declared, "...open your eyes and look at the fields! They are ripe for harvest." He was speaking of those that had not yet heard the Gospel.

By God's grace our VISION 20/20 challenge will make South Jersey more like Nigeria, by gathering many who have not been touched by the gospel into loving places of worship, from all people groups.

THE SOUTH JERSEY PLAN

The New Jersey Presbytery has embarked on a plan to plant *at least* one church in Southern New Jersey per year. Our VISION TWENTY/ TWENTY slogan captures our goal of *at least* twenty churches in our Presbytery by year 2020, growing from our current eleven established churches.

A GREAT START

In 2009 the New Jersey Presbytery initiated churches in Atlantic City and in Gloucester County. A third church is scheduled for planting in the City of Camden early 2011, and a church planter is now being recruited for the Township of Hamilton. First steps are also being taken for a Hispanic Church in the Vineland-Bridgeton-Millville region.

Other municipalities targeted for future PCA churches include Toms River Township, Brick Township, City of Trenton, Manchester Township, Jackson Township, and Asbury Park. It is anticipated daughter churches will also be started by some of our new church plants.

Strategies are in place to ensure the availability of qualified pastors to start the PCA congregations, who are suited for the cultural and demographic challenges associated with targeted communities.
